I would like to encourage as many of you as possible to attend the event, so that everyone can blow out the 150 candles on the birthday cake of our beloved Royal.


Last but not least, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the organising committee for all the work already undertaken.

The first stamp collector?

The collecting of stamps as a recognised pursuit dates from the early 1860s. There were collectors earlier than this but there was not yet any organisation around the hobby. I clearly recall having heard of a collection of revenue stamps that was formed in the early years of the nineteenth century but am unable to find the reference to this. However, I do own a rather apologetic letter from an early collector asking the recipient to put aside postage stamps for a collector:

"Dear Henry,

If you can descend to any thing so trifling I will again ask you to put by all the postage stamps you can: I having had a request from another quarter to assist in making a collection of them.

Yours very truly,

John M. Davenport Oxon 14 Decr 1841"

On the face of it there is nothing remarkable about this letter except that it is dated December 1841, a matter of only 18 months after the issue of the first postage stamp.

Development of collecting - the early days

The subject of what among postage stamps was important in terms of what a collector should collect generated considerable discussion in the early days of the hobby. The leading magazines of the time were mostly in French (1863 - *Le Timbre-Poste*, published in Brussels by Jean-Baptiste Moens, 1864 - *Le Collectionneur de Timbres-Poste*, published in Paris by M. Maury and 1864 - *Le Timbrophile*, published in Paris by Pierre Mahé) and in the United Kingdom there was 1863 - *The Stamp Collector's Magazine*, published in Bath by Stafford Smith.

In his editorial in the first issue of *Le Timbre-Poste*, Moens comments on the current market for the collection of stamps:

"For these two years past, the different types of stamps from many countries having grown from day to day in a way that beats all predictions, it has become urgent that collectors are informed in the most exact way possible those stamps that exist, on a large part of which they have generally only considerable uncertainty.

We are embarking upon gathering this information and are in the process of preparing during the coming year a first catalogue."

Le Timbre-Poste attaches the same level of importance to postage stamps, postal stationery, telegraph stamps, local stamps and, from 1874 in a supplement called *Le Timbre Fiscal*, revenue stamps.

In fact the first illustrated catalogue pre-dates the Moens publication and was *The Stamp Collectors Guide*, a catalogue produced by Frederick Booty in August 1862. This remarkable and rare publication includes very passable drawings of the postage stamps and stationery issued at that date.

Development of collecting - the English method v the French method

An article published in *Le Timbre-Poste* of October 1866 under the name of 'Dr. Magnus' (pseudonym of Dr. Jacques Amable Legrand) quotes a letter from *The Stamp Collector's Magazine* of August 1866. The letter sets out the British approach to what should and should not be considered important for the collector:

"The French make little distinctions between perforated stamps and stamps separated by roulettes, between large perforations and small; the number of holes made by the perforating machine is a matter of serious study by the Parisian enthusiasts. It is a matter of fact that their principal journal gravely reports such matters, that whilst the numbers of perforations of the 1, 3 and 5 kopek of Russia were previously 15 by 11 they are now 18 by 13. Timbromania is truly the proper name for the actions of collectors of stamps when it attains this level of absurdity."


The view was not shared by all, even in the United Kingdom, as shown by another letter quoted from the same edition of *The Stamp Collector's Magazine*:

"We prefer and think that it is at once useful and convenient to examine the reverse side of the stamps, their edges, their colour, in order to classify them accurately."

A wry comment is made that it is a singular matter that it was Henry Archer, a native of Ireland, who invented and promoted the first perforating machine and it is the English who are ignoring perforations.

The article thereafter addresses the various types of perforation encountered on stamps and encourages the collection of both imperforate and perforated stamps. As a method of distinguishing the various gauges of perforation, the measurement of the numbers of holes in a two centimetre length is suggested and a possible perforation gauge is illustrated, which looks exactly like most gauges used since then.

As we now know, the French approach won the day. It became the acknowledged level of sophistication for the collector, even to the extent that the word 'Philatélie' became the accepted description for the collection and study of stamps.

One of the earliest catalogues in English, that by John Edward Gray of The British Museum called *A Hand Catalogue of Postage Stamps for the use of Collectors* dated 1863, has one of the most compelling comments on collecting in general and the collection of stamps in particular that I have seen:

"The collecting of Postage Stamps is a fashion not confined to this country, or to a single class; for collections are frequently to be seen in the drawing-room of the luxurious, in the study of the enlightened, and the locker of the schoolboy

The fashion has been ridiculed, as all fashions will be; but if postage stamps are properly studied, collected, and arranged, there is no reason why they may not be quite as instructive and entertaining as the collection of birds, butterflies, shells, books, engravings, coins, or other objects. The use and charm of collecting any kind of object is to educate the mind and the eye to careful observation, accurate comparison, and just reasoning on the differences and likenesses which they present"

It would be hard to improve on that summary.





Development of collecting – increasing sophistication


The promised Moens catalogue was published in March 1864 and included a wonderful range of illustrations, astonishing in their accuracy. In fact there are a number of these where the printing blocks were later used to create forgeries.

This catalogue revolutionised the collecting of stamps, showing for the first time in detail the designs sufficiently accurately for the collector to be able to distinguish the genuine from the forgery.

The formation of the world's oldest continuously existing philatelic society dates from 1869 with the formation of The Philatelic Society, London (from 1906 The Royal Philatelic Society, London). Its objects were *"to collect all possible information respecting postage*


stamps, the prevention of forgeries, facilitating and spreading the knowledge of philately, and facilitating the acquisition and exchange of postage stamps among members". The Society membership qualifications were defined as "all amateurs be eligible for election as members of the Society", although Edward L. Pemberton, one of the foremost early dealers, was co-opted to serve on the committee of the Society.

Another dealer member, elected by unanimous consent in 1878 to "set aside in your favour" the rule confining full membership to amateurs was A. H. Wilson. Wilson shortly afterwards went on to form the firm of Pemberton, Wilson and Co. after the unexpected early death of E. L. Pemberton and the firm's publication *The Philatelic Record* carried notes of the meetings of the Society until the launch of *The London Philatelist* in January 1892.



The first illustrated catalogue from J.-B. Moens, Paris & Brussels - March 1864






"How to Detect Forged Stamps" by Thomas Dalston, Barnard Castle, April 1865

The forgery of stamps had been a problem for the collector from the earliest days of the hobby taking off in the early 1860s. The forging of stamps for the purposes of defrauding the post office (so-called "postal forgeries") had been troubling the postal authorities from the time of the issue of the first stamps. The forging of revenue stamps goes back still further and British criminal court records record numbers of individuals in the late seventeenth century and throughout the eighteenth century who were put to death for the forgery of revenue stamps.

These early forgeries were more or less crude reproductions of postage stamps and were not designed to fool the collector but rather to provide cheap alternatives to the real thing in order to fill the spaces in the stamps albums of the time. J.-B. Moens published a slim volume in 1862, describing various philatelic forgeries, of which an English translation exists by E. Doble of Falmouth. The more comprehensive book by Thomas Dalston is dated April 1865, who warns:

"I would caution collectors not to purchase any stamps as rare that are not mentioned in the best catalogues, or any that are new which are not mentioned in «Stamp Collector's Magazine», «Stamp Collector's Miscellany" or «Stamp Collector's Examiner»". Dalston estimates that "the number of collectors in England alone may be counted by hundreds".

The levels of sophistication continued their upwards trend with *The Philatelic Handbook* by Major E.B. Evans, published in January 1885. Evans was one of the early members of The Philatelic Society, London, having joined in 1875. He was a member of the committee of the Society in 1891 and, when the Expert Committee was formed in 1894, he became one of the three original members, together with E. D. Bacon and M. P. Castle. *The Philatelic Handbook* was a detailed listing of the stamps of the world.

By this time the study of watermarks and perforations was an established aspect of philately, and the handbook even listed different shades of the same stamp.





Development of "Importance" in exhibiting

Exhibits of postage stamps were a regular feature of the many scientific and lifestyle exhibitions of the second half of the nineteenth century. Dr. Magnus, writing in the 15 June 1867 edition of *Le Timbrophile*, gives an eye-witness account of the De La Rue stand at the Exposition Universelle de Paris in 1867. In his article he describes items on show that have assisted in identifying and dating certain proofs.

However, competitive exhibiting for the stamp collector came somewhat later. For the purposes of demonstrating the evolution of thinking during the roughly 130 years of competitive philatelic exhibiting, three exhibitions have been selected: Manchester 1899, Philympia (London) 1970 and Finlandia (Tampere) 2017.

International Exhibition -Manchester, 1899

Among the classes are:

Class I	Special collections of Postal Adhesive

As can be seen, the emphasis was very different from today. The judging was based on collections rather than exhibits. Quantity and rarity ruled the day. Guidance was offered to the judges on other matters that should be taken into account in making their decision. Nevertheless one might describe the most important matters for the purposes of judging was material, material; "In making their awards the Judges will be requested to take into special consideration, not only the rarity and completeness of the Exhibit, but also the neatness and accuracy of arrangement, method of mounting and condition of the specimens submitted, and the Philatelic knowledge displayed by the Exhibitor."

Philympia International 1970 – London

Several changes were introduced for this international exhibition which show progress towards the classes that are now so familiar at exhibitions:

- Postal History makes its appearance as a footnote
- Rules Item 4

Items of a pre-adhesive nature may be included but must not exceed 25% of an exhibit, but because of the interest in purely pre-adhesive and stampless Postal History, exhibits limited to Collections with International Merit and that these entries should be included in their normal group or section and judged in accordance with the Rules of the Exhibition, i.e. "on its own merit", and that such exhibits be limited to a maximum of four frames.

• Group 14

Subject Collections – the thematic concept was very early in its development

The jury were given guidance on the judging process. These sound familiar but there was no marking by points and no specific mention of Rarity and Importance. The subject of Treatment, which today is such an important element of the best exhibits, is only mentioned in terms of *"completeness and scope of the exhibit"*.

The criteria in the application form stated:

- The Jury will be requested to base its awards on a consideration of the following qualifications:
 - Up-to-date philatelic knowledge and any personal research
 - Completeness and scope of the exhibit
 - Condition
 - Arrangement and neatness of Presentation




Finlandia International 2017 -Tampere

Today the FIP rules are used, with marks attributed to various aspects of the exhibit:

Treatment & Philatelic Importance	30 points (split 20 / 10)
Philatelic and related Knowledge, Personal Study and Research	35 points (split 20 / 15)
Condition and Rarity	30 points (split 10 / 20)
Presentation	5 points
	100 points

n.b. The choice and presentation of material in terms of demonstrating its importance is fundamental to scoring a high mark and affects the marking across all segments – the feel-good factor.





Rules and Regulations for Exhibitors and Exhibit Details – Philympia 1970 Catalogue

Summary

Much has changed over the last century. Exhibiting has moved:



Today:

- Material and its importance are at the heart of the exhibit
- The exhibitor needs to make the best of the material in terms of demonstrating its importance

FIP definition of "Importance"

Definition of "Importance" – GREV "importance" is synonymous with "significance"

- FIP criteria for evaluation (paraphrased from GREV Article 4.6) requires an assessment of:
 - The philatelic significance of the subject chosen
 - The scope of the exhibit
 - The degree of difficulty of the subject
 - The philatelic interest of the exhibit

Definition of "Importance" - SREV

- In assessing importance within an exhibit consideration is given in three segments (paraphrased from SREV Article 3.4) to:
 - How much of the key material of the chosen subject is present
 - The significance of the subject within the philately of the country or area exhibited
 - The significance of the subject on a worldwide scale

n.b. One of the difficulties of assessing importance for a more modern exhibit is that insufficient time may have elapsed to permit a judgement on the criterion. The passage of time is needed in order to give it context. However, an excellent modern exhibit with outstanding material, knowledge and treatment is accepted as being more important than a weak classic exhibit. The introduction of three time periods for competitive exhibition purposes has solved some of this particular problem.





How does the judge measure "Importance"?

An approach taken by many is to asses Importance on three levels; dividing the 10 marks into three:

Level 1 – Importance on a Worldwide scale – the significance of the subject across the philately of all countries. For instance:

- A first issue of a major country would generally be more significant than that of a minor country
- An early issue would generally be more significant than a more modern issue
- An internationally accepted issue would generally be more significant than an issue with only local acceptability
- A definitive issue would generally be more significant than an ephemeral commemorative issue

Level 2 – Importance on a Country or Regional scale – the significance of the subject within the

philately of the country or region. For instance:

- An early issue would generally be more significant than a more modern issue
- However, events within a country may elevate the importance of a particular subject e.g. the Franco-Prussian War and Ballons Montés within French postal history
- A definitive issue would generally be more significant than an ephemeral commemorative issue
- The postal history of a major trading city would be more significant than the postal history of a small village

Level 3 - The Importance of the Exhibit itself

- the significance of the particular exhibit within its chosen subject. For instance:

- Is the exhibit complete in all important aspects of the subject? n.b. excluding some significant aspects would lower the importance even if that is mentioned in the introductory statement
- Is the exhibit repeatable?
- Does it contain all the significant items relating to the subject chosen?
- Does it focus on the more significant aspects of the subject? e.g. an exhibit of fly-speck varieties would be considered less significant than one that focused on major aspects of the issue

How does the exhibitor set out to enhance "Importance"?

If "Treatment" is the storyline of an exhibit, the narrative, then "Importance" is the judgement that one exhibit of a subject is superior to another exhibit of the same subject. Superficially similar exhibits can be differentiated based on one having greater substance, significance and importance when compared against others. This will be based on showing:


- 1. Why is this important? Has the exhibitor made a case for his subject being of importance? Some subjects are obviously important; others need the case to be made for them.
- 2. Selection of material Is the exhibitor showing material that is exceptional? An exhibit can contain a complete range of the material but may contain only uninteresting items. For instance:
 - a. Are all the usages standard usages or are they exceptional, such as used on parcel labels, unusual routes, rare rates etc?
 - b. Has the exhibitor chosen material with eye-appeal as opposed to boring material?
 - c. Is there a "wow" factor?
- 3. Display of the material Is it easy to identify those items which may be important or has the exhibitor made them difficult to spot. The exhibitor needs to consider:
 - a. Balance and structure on a page;
 - b. Position of important items within the exhibition frame;
 - c. Anchor points within the overall exhibit especially the beginning and the end.

What I am suggesting is that all these aspects can to a greater or lesser extent be controlled by the exhibitor. The title page, the synopsis of the exhibit, the selection of the material, and the method of display can all be used to add to the perception of importance and all are within the control of the exhibitor.

Giving context in order to enhance "Importance"

By way of example I offer an exhibit that is superficially unimportant but has scored in the low 90s in international exhibition:





This is an exhibit of the College Stamps of Oxford and Cambridge. Stamps and stationery were issued during the period 1871 to 1886 in order for the students and tutors at the various Colleges to pay for letter deliveries within the two cities. They are a popular collecting subject but the average judge and viewer will have only a basic knowledge of subject. How, therefore, do I assist in enhancing the appreciation of the judge as to importance of the subject and of the exhibit?

• At first glance the idea that a local post within two provincial cities operating for a fifteen year period in the late nineteenth century could be any significance is not promising as a thesis;

However, the context and background leads to more favourable conclusions:

- The two great University Cities of Oxford and Cambridge were among the great centres of learning within Britain, with several Colleges founded by various monarchs. Since their foundation in the thirteenth century, the Crown and the State have accepted them as having exceptional importance as places of learning and have permitted them to communicate with one another and with London in order to encourage their scholastic endeavours.
- The carriage of letters was a jealously guarded privilege of the State, but a most important exception was made for communications within and between the two University Cities and to London. This exception has existed from the date of the founding of the first Colleges.
- Thus the exception of the College posts from the State monopoly on the carriage of letters makes the College postal systems one of the oldest organised systems in the world and pre-dates the founding of the British General Post by several hundreds of years.
- The subject has been considered philatelically important in terms of a collecting area since the time of issue of the College stamps. Major collectors have built significant collections, including King George V, The Earl of Crawford, Thomas Tapling, J.B. Seymour, R.A.G. Lee, among others. The first articles on the College Stamps appear in The London Philatelist in 1894 and the first comprehensive book on the subject was published in 1906.
- As an exhibit of the College stamps, the collection stands as the finest that exists outside of institutional collections. It contains the only hand-drawn essays, many of the finest covers, the original die proofs of many of the designs, and unique items of stamps and stationery.


The title page makes the case that the subject is worthy of being considered as important in the context of the being among the earliest postal systems in the world and an important exception to the State postal monopoly within Britain. The exhibit synopsis is used to emphasise the importance and to highlight and explain the key items within the exhibit in terms of their importance and rarity. These are followed through in the design of the pages, giving guidance on rarity and importance in the write-up of each page and in the design of the pages.





Thoughts on page design


With a little effort the design of a page can be used to direct the viewer to those items that the exhibitor wants to be noticed.



Rearrange the presentation and the messaging can be very different. Items that were previously lost are now highlighted and visually separated.







Find ways of breaking monotonous presentations.


The Cape of Good Hope general duty revenue stamps could form a long set of over 150 stamps if treated purely by value or date of issue.

Breaking down by face value and tracing the value through its various evolutions of colour, watermark, and perforation is a more manageable concept that also offers variety in terms of texture and colour within each page.






Find that "wow" factor



Miniature Almanacs

The page is a part of an exhibit of revenue stamps - almanacs were taxed from 1712 until 1834.

The duty mark is shown on the top almanac but the bindings are shown of the others as they have a far greater visual attraction Find that "wow" factor

The page is a part of an exhibit of revenue stamps – silver plate was taxed at various times throughout the 18th and 19th centuries.

The duty mark is the monarch's head stamped as part of the hallmark on silver plate from 1784 to 1890

Concluding remarks

It is within the power of the exhibitor to influence the judges and the viewer in terms of the appreciation of their exhibit:

- Put your exhibit into a wider context in order to enhance its significance
- Assist the judges in focusing on the important aspects
- Make it obvious what are the key items
- Understand that exhibiting is both a visual and an intellectual exercise
- Find material to attract the "wow" factor

It will not just be the viewer and the judges that will appreciate your material. You yourself will also treasure it more.



STOCKHOLMIA 2019 is the designated international celebration of the sesquicentennial (150th Anniversary) of the Royal Philatelic Society London (RPSL) as the oldest, continuous philatelic society in the world. As the global center of philatelic excellence, fraternity and on-going activities, the RPSL wants to emphasize its worldwide community of members by having this important international celebration in another country, choosing Stockholm for this honour. The Patron of the RPSL is Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II of the United Kingdom and the Commonwealth of Nations, while the Patron of the exhibition in Stockholm is His Majesty, King Carl XVI Gustaf of Sweden.

Stockholm was chosen by the RPSL because it has one of the best infrastructures in the world when it comes to holding conventions, with one of Europe's most modern and largest convention centers, the Stockholm Waterfront Congress Centre, supported by

the full range of nearby hotels, restaurants and services – from the very top of the line to the more affordable. While Stockholm is a modern city in many ways, the city has its own unique ambience of beautiful old streets and numerous canals. Because it is built on an archipelago of small islands, Stockholm is often called the Venice of the North. At this time of year during the exhibition, flowers and tree blossoms are usually in full bloom around the city. The exhibition will be open for five days, from Wednesday 29 May through Sunday 2 June, 2019. Philatelists, "Early Birds" and Visitors to the exhibition are welcome to register for the Pre-Opening Party (the Vernissage) on the evening of Tuesday 28 May, from 3.00 p.m. to 7.00 p.m.

Our vision for STOCKHOLMIA 2019 is to develop and improve the existing standards for philatelic events worldwide. STOCKHOLMIA 2019 may in the future be recognised as a new milestone for philatelic gatherings.

There are four themes on the program. These are introduced here:

- Master Classes

The daily program presented herewith is a draft and changes may occur until its final presentation in the Exhibition Catalogue.



Philatelic Seminars, Congresses and Society Meetings

The **ABPS Philatelic Congress** (the Association of British Philatelic Societies) will be held in the large auditorium (level 6-7) on Thursday and Friday 30-31 May. The theme of the congress is the "Future of Philately". **The World Cinderella Conference** will be held on Saturday and Sunday 1-2 June. This is a special occasion to get acquainted to this interesting topic. Other than this, many other ABPS Societies will organise their meetings during the exhibition.

The **International Federation of Stamp Dealers Associations** (IFSDA) are one of the partners to the exhibition and will conduct their meeting program. The **European Academy of Philately** (AEP) has also planned a meeting during the exhibition days.

The Royal Philatelic Society London (RPSL) will conduct four official meetings comprising program presentations. The RPSL President Patrick Maselis has invited four internationally recognized members to conduct four presentations:

- RPSL Meeting 1 on Wednesday 29 May: Mr. Scott Trepel will give a presentation on The Transcontinental Pony Express 1860-1861
 Nineteen Months of Operation and An Eternity of Fascination.
- RPSL Meeting 2 on Thursday 30 May: Mr. Henk Slabbinck will give a presentation on **French Presence in India.**
- RPSL Meeting 3 on Friday 31 May: Mr. Eddie Bridges will give a presentation on **The Darmstadt Trials** of the Union of South Africa: Controversary and Intrigue!
- RPSL Meeting 4 on Saturday 1 June: Mr. John Barwis will give a presentation on **Maritime Mail Routes from Victoria.**

The RPSL presentations will start at 3.00pm and will be conducted in the auditorium and are open to Fellows, Members and their Guests, but of course also as marketing of Society they will be open for the public.

The **Global Philatelic Network**, as the philatelic partner for the international celebration of the 150th anniversary of The Royal Philatelic Society London is the official auctioneer for the STOCKHOLMIA 2019 Rarity Auction, to be conducted in the auditorium on Saturday 1 June.

Level 3 of the Waterfront Congress Centre is reserved for activities of The Royal Philatelic Society London and the exhibition's library activities. The society will have a sales stand were merchandise and membership information will be offered. The Expert Committee will be present and demonstrate its competence and expertise. A special area will be allocated for members' socialising. A President's Anniversary Display, by Patrick Maselis, at 10 frames will be presented, and another 10 frames selected from the society's Philatelic Collections. Another selection presented in 8 cabinets will be made from the society's Museum Collections. Visitors will find a **unique literature exhibition** of rare RPSL and Crawford Medal Winning literature (10 + 10 cabinets). A reading room with the exhibited philatelic literature and two library presentation rooms will be next door to these activities. It is planned to have lectures, presentations and new book presentations every day. The library activities are planned and hosted by The Association Internationale des Journalistes Philatéliques (AIJP).

The Swedish Philatelic Federation is national philatelic partner and will allocate one meeting room all five days for a philatelic program addressing the Swedish speaking audience.


Master Classes

MEDALS OF THE MUSEUM OF PHILATELIC HISTORY

Juliet Turk RPSL Museum Curator

This selection of medals from The Museum of Philatelic History has been prepared for a display at the MALMEX 2018 exhibition in Malmö, Sweden, running from the 31st August to the 2nd September 2018. The exhibition will kick off the publicity for STOCKHOLMIA 2019 which sees The Royal Philatelic Society London celebrate its 150th anniversary. The medals symbolise the major elements of the hobby and showcase the achievements of philatelists all over the world.

The Museum of Philatelic History at The Royal Philatelic Society London has the largest and most significant collection of philatelic exhibition medals in the world. Our collection currently amounts to roughly 1,400 medals and this number continues to grow with new donations being made every month. The medals date from the Wyon Medal of 1837 to present day, and demonstrate the achievements of philatelists in the fields of research, exhibition and literature. The collection also demonstrates the global impact of philately, with representations of philatelic exhibitions from Great Britain to America to Indonesia.

At the start of 2018, the Museum was awarded a grant from the Museum Development Office in London to repackage and digitise our collection of exhibition medals in preparation for the Society's move to 15 Abchurch Lane. The sum of \pounds 500 enabled us to purchase conservation materials to repackage the collection, preventing further deterioration whilst in storage and to safeguard against damage during the move. Working with our team of volunteers, over 700 medals have now been photographed and repackaged. Our aim has been to improve the conservation provision for the collection but also to increase access to the collections.

The Wyon Medal was used as the basis to design the world's first postage stamp, the Penny Black



WYON MEDAL

Created in honour of Her Majesty Queen Victoria's visit to the Corporation of London on the 4th November 1837. It was engraved by William Wyon, chief engraver at the Royal Mint from 1828 to 1851.

The Wyon Head was used as the basis to design the world's first postage stamp, the Penny Black. The artist Henry Corbould produced a drawing of the head based on the Wyon Medal, and the printers Perkins Bacon experimented with engine turning to produce the background. By January 1840, the head was ready for engraving and this was carried out by Frederick Heath, son of Charles Heath, a onetime partner of Perkins. Following a number of iterations the final design of the Penny Black emerged, not only was it the world's first stamp, but also a classic example of design.

Looking to the future, we will continue to research the medals considering their design, context, provenance and award recipients. We hope to build up a comprehensive list of all philatelic exhibitions which can be reflected through the collection. Where gaps in our collection are identified, these will be sought through donation or fundraising. Society Medals



BACON MEDAL

This medal is awarded to Honorary Fellows of The Royal Philatelic Society London. Introduced in 2015, the Bacon Medal was created in homage to Sir Edward Denny Bacon, a member of the Society for 58 years who held various positions in the Society including President from 1917 to 1923. The Society's most prestigious award, it is awarded "to those who have made the highest contribution to the Society."

In more recent years, the medal has been awarded to: Alan Huggins 2002, Jane Moubray 2004, Michael Moubray 2004, Robert Odenweller 2007, Francis Edgar Kiddle 2009, Michael Farrant 2011, Tomas Bjäringer 2013 and Christopher Gill Harman 2014. The most recent award was made to Chris King for his efforts in helping the Society secure a new home in the City of London.

LEE MEDAL

This silver-gilt medal was introduced in 2002 in memory of the late Ronald Lee and Alma Lee. It was first awarded on the 28th November 2002 to Joseph Hackmey RDP FRPSL for his display and paper, 'Chile – the Colon (Columbus) Heads.' On this occasion, Jeremy and Miranda Long, nephew and niece of Ronald and Alma Lee, were present and were awarded a Lee Medal as a souvenir of the occasion. Made by Toye, Kenning & Spencer, this proof copy was acquired by the Society in 2018.

The medal is awarded "for the best 5pm presentation at an ordinary meeting dealing with any aspect of philately given by one person, or jointly by two people being either a Fellow or Member. A display shall not be disqualified for the Lee Medal by reason of the fact that it contains borrowed material, provided that the amount thereof is small and its source is disclosed."

CRAWFORD MEDAL

Awarded in 1920 to Hugo Griebert for his work, 'The Stamps of Spain 1850-1854'. This silver-gilt medal was the first Crawford Medal ever to be awarded by The Royal Philatelic Society London. It was purchased by the Society in 2012.

The Crawford Medal is awarded "for the most valuable and original contribution to the study and knowledge of philately published in book form during the relevant period."

THE ROYAL PHILATELIC SOCIETY LONDON MEDAL

Awarded to Mrs Lilian F. Clark in 1983 for her services to The Royal Philatelic Society London and her hard work as Secretary to the Expert Committee. After her death in June 1994, the medal was donated back to the Society by Peter Mollett in 1997.

A silver medal, it is awarded "to a Fellow or Member who, in the opinion of Council, has rendered outstanding service to the Society otherwise than in the course of duty as an Officer of the Society."

The first Royal Philatelic Society London medal was awarded to Sir John Wilson in 1969. The medal was last awarded in 2016 to Maurice Flack FRPSL for his "outstanding commitment and support to the Society's administration" and Eric Keefe FRPSL for his "assiduous and exceptional support for the Society's library over many years as 'Team Leader' of the Monday Club volunteers."

TAPLING MEDAL

Awarded in 1923 to Herbert R. Oldfield, then Honorary Secretary of The Royal Philatelic Society, for his paper on 'The Earlier Issues of India'. It was purchased by the Society in 2012.

A silver medal, it is awarded "for the best paper, or supplement published in The London Philatelist dealing with any aspect of philately during the relevant period."

The first Tapling Medal was awarded in 1920 to Mr C. Lathrop Pack for his illustrated paper on '2d Victoria (Half-Lengths) and the Reconstruction of the Fourth Printing' by Thomas Ham. 2012.544





TILLEARD MEDAL

Awarded in 1948 to H.C.V. Adams for his Great Britain display given before The Royal Philatelic Society London on the 24th October 1946. It was purchased by the Society in 2012.

This silver medal is awarded "for the best 1pm display of any aspect of philately, given at an ordinary meeting of the Society, during the relevant period, by one, or not more than two persons. Where the award is made to a joint display by two individuals each will be awarded a Medal. A display shall not be disqualified for the Tilleard Medal by reason of the fact that it contains borrowed material, provided that the amount thereof is small and its source is disclosed."

The first Tilleard Medal was awarded to Lieutenant Colonel A.S. Bates, D.S.O., T.D., for his display of the 'Essays of Great Britain'. 2012.542



RPSL PLAQUETTE

This plaquette was awarded to A.G.M Batten for his three displays: 'A Philatelic Approach to Entomology' on the 5th November 1970, 'Orange Free State and the Orange River Colony' on the 20th January 1977 and 'Postal Markings of the Orange Free State and the Orange River Colony' on the 20th January 1983.

This plaquette is awarded to a Member or Fellow of The Royal Philatelic Society London after their 1pm or 5pm presentation. Plaquettes are presented by the President and engraved with the displayer's name and display date.

LINDENBERG MEDAL

The Lindenberg Medal is awarded by the Berlin Philatelists' Club for special services to philately. The medal was founded in 1905 in honour of Carl Lindenberg, a well-known philatelist and lawyer.

This medal was awarded to Bernard "Bud" Hennig in 1987.

LONDON PHILATELIC EXHIBITION 1890 MEDAL

This silver medal was awarded to Thomas Maycock at the London Philatelic Exhibition in 1890 for his stamps of St. Lucia and St. Vincent. Running from the 19th-26th May, the exhibition was held at the Portman Rooms, Baker Street, London.

The exhibition marked the 50th anniversary of the introduction of postage stamps and was opened by the Duke of Edinburgh, Prince Alfred of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, then Honorary President of The Philatelic Society London.

INTERNATIONAL PHILATELIC EXHIBITION 1906 MEDAL

This silver medal was awarded to Herbert R. Oldfield in 1906, then Honorary Assistant Secretary of The Philatelic Society London. It was awarded at the International Philatelic Exhibition held at Caxton Hall, Westminster from the 23rd May to the 1st June 1906.

ABPS NATIONAL STAMP EXHIBITION 2004 MEDAL

Awarded to Gavin H. Fryer, Surrey, 1st Team at the Association of British Philatelic Societies (ABPS) National Stamp Exhibition held in Basildon, 2004.



ROYAL PHILATELIC SOCIETY LONDON EXHIBITION MEDAL

Introduced in 1948, this bronze medal was made by Cecil Thomas of South Kensington. It was awarded for the best display at international exhibitions or for outstanding contributions to international philately.

The first award was made at the Paris International Exhibition in 1949. Very seldom making an appearance, it was last awarded at The Royal Philatelic Society's Centenary Exhibition, 7th-9th December 2006. Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II graciously agreed to accept the award which was offered with gratitude from the many Fellows and Members of the Society for many years of enjoyment from seeing Her Majesty's collection at meetings of the Society. She received the award during a private audience held at Buckingham Palace on the 8th November 2006.

This medal was awarded to Francis Kiddle as a member of the jury at the ,Nordia 2010' exhibition held at Boras, Sweden, from the 28th to the 30th May 2010.

FINLANDIA 2017 MEDAL

This medal was awarded at the Fédération Internationale de Philatélie (FIP) European Stamp Exhibition at Tampere, from the 24th to the 28th May 2017. It was awarded to Jon Aitchison FRPSL for his 'Guernsey Revenue Stamps'.

The design of the medal was the result of a competition arranged by the Finnish Guild of Medal Arts whereby the winning entry was that of sculptor and designer, Pekka Rytkönen. The front side of the medal depicts philatelic culture as shown by a postcard with a stamp and philatelic tools of the trade. On the rear side of the medal is a depiction of a calm and serene view, a design which reflects the 1930 pictorial stamp used to produce the famous Finnish stamp, the Zeppelin overprint. 2017.13.3.1

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
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




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
